

So, kids, 'to give someone a hard time 'is an idiom which means to
treat someone harshly and make things difficult for them.
An idiom is a group of words where the meaning cannot be inferred simply by looking at the individual words. It is a phrase or saying that is commonly used in

everyday English to express certain ideas or opinions. Understanding English idioms is important because they require a deeper familiarity of the English language to comprehend what someone means when they use them in conversation. They can boost your conversational English skills.

Idioms may seem complicated at first, but they can actually be a lot of fun to learn.
