



doesn't imply its literal meaning, it actually means that Ayesha found the fifth part <u>'very</u> <u>difficult to understand'</u>. Similarly, when Rahul says that it was <u>'a piece of cake'</u> for him, he means that it was <u>'very easy to do'</u>. These kinds of expressions are called **'Idioms'**.

Now, what are Idioms????



An Idiom is a group of words, whose meaning cannot be understood simply by looking at the individual words, but by understanding the context they have been used in. Like, in the example in the given picture, the expression <u>'break the ice'</u> means <u>'to say or do something</u> <u>to make people feel relaxed or comfortable'</u>.

Did you notice, children, that all the examples given above contain **words related to a kitchen**; like – nut, cake, ice. Similarly, there are many more idioms based on various themes; such as – colours, body parts, nature, happiness etc. Let us look at some more **idioms based on kitchen items** along with their meanings :–
