<u> Topic 10- Articles (A/An/The)</u>


Dear Students

ARTICLES

I. INTRODUCTION

The articles are the words "a," "an," and "the." They define whether something is specific or unspecific. The meaning of the message is affected if the articles are not used properly.



There are **<u>two</u>** types of articles:

(1) **The Definite Article (The)** - "The" is called the definite article. It defines its noun as something specific (something previously mentioned or known, something unique, something being identified by the speaker).

Examples:

- I fell over the chair again. (The chair is specific. It is known to the audience.)
- I loved the apple pie after the meal. (In this example, the audience knows which apple pie is being praised, e.g., the one at last night's dinner.)

(2) **The Indefinite Article (A, An)** - "A" and "an" are called the indefinite articles. They define their noun as something unspecific (something mentioned for the first time).

Examples:

- This is **a** lake.
- (This is a previously unspecified lake.)
- Can you pass me a chair?
 (This means an unspecific chair, i.e., any chair.)

II. EXPLANATION

Usage of Definite Article (THE)

• The article '**the'** is used after you have already mentioned someone/something or if the context tells you which object or person you are talking about.

For example -

• "I have found a golf course in Pitampura. The golf course is quite widespread."

Here in the first sentence, the golf course is being mentioned for the first time. It's context is not set before, it's brand new information. But in the sentence that follows, the golf course has already been mentioned once. The context for the noun is set and therefore, the user is familiar with the noun.

3. 'The' is used before nouns that are unique:

Examples:

the sun, the moon, the Arabian sea, the Bermuda triangle, the Eiffel tower, the Himalayas and so on.

4. 'The' is used with superlative adjectives. Examples:

- My mother cooks *the* best cookies in the world.
- We forgot the most interesting point.

5. 'The' is used before adjectives to talk about groups of people. Examples:

• We must look after *the* elderly.

• The rich don't know how *the* poor live.

6. 'The' is used with Proper nouns: Names of countries, some titles, some organisations, some buildings, newspapers, works of art, specific family names, mountains, rivers, seas, groups of islands, and deserts.

Examples:

• *The* Indian ocean, *the* Bay of Bengal, *the* Netherlands, *the* Caspian, *the* United States of America, *the* Taj Mahal, *the* Times of India, *the* Suez Canal, *the* Guptas.

7. 'the' is used with nationalities Examples:

- *The* British ruled India for 200 years.
- *"The* Belgian chocolate is impossible to resist."

Even if nationality is in the plural. Like:

- "The Indians aced in chess at the championship."
- *"The* Americans."

USAGE OF INDEFINITE ARTICLES (A / AN)

Indefinite articles are used when we are referring to an unspecified thing or quantity. We use them when we don't know which thing we are talking about.

- Use '*a*' when the indefinite article comes before a word beginning with a consonant sound: a book, a toy, a house.
- Use '*an'* when the indefinite article comes before a word beginning with a vowel sound: an operation, an idea, an apple.
- **NOTE**: Always trust the sound, not the letter when using a or an. Remember, it's about pronunciation. *Example:*
 - ✤ a hour: Incorrect
 - ✤ an hour: Correct
 - Use a/an when you mention something or someone for the first time. *Examples:*
 - ✤ I saw a rainbow yesterday.
 - ✤ I consulted an optician yesterday.
 - Use a/an to show someone or something is one of a group. *Example:*
 - ✤ He is an optician in London.
 - Use a/an when you say what someone's job is. *Examples:*
 - ✤ He is a doctor.
 - ✤ My mother is a nurse.
 - ✤ She is an engineer.
 - Indefinite Articles with Uncountable Nouns

Uncountable nouns are nouns that are either difficult or impossible to count. Uncountable nouns include things that are too large or numerous to count (e.g., equipment, sand, wood). Because these things can't be counted, you should never use **a** or **an** with them.

- The indefinite article is only for singular nouns.
- Uncountable nouns can be modified by using *some*.

Examples:

Please give me a/an water. - Incorrect

Water is an uncountable noun and should not be used with the indefinite article.

Please give me some water. - Correct

However, if you describe the water in terms of countable units (like bottles), you can use the indefinite article.

Examples:


- ✤ Please give me a bottle of water.
- Please give me an ice cube.
- Do not use a/an with plural nouns:

Example-

- I ate a/an cherries yesterday Incorrect
- ✤ I ate cherries yesterday Correct

III. SUMMARY

- Articles (A/An/The) are the words that describe a noun as specific/not specific.
- There are two types of articles in English The definite article 'The' and the indefinite articles 'A' and 'An'
- The definite article 'the' is used before specific objects and things that are unique.
- Indefinite Articles are used when we study about something for the first time, or singular objects usually.
- Refer to the tables given below for a clearer understanding.



INDEFINITE ARTICLE (a/an)

USE	EXAMPLE	NOTES
To refer to something for the first time	An elephant and a mouse fell in love. Would you like a drink? I've finally got a good job.	Yesterday I met <u>a boy</u> near my house. <u>The boy</u> wanted to comunicate with me.
meaning 'one', referring to a single object or person:	I'd like <i>an orange</i> and two lemons please.	Notice also that we usually say <u>a hundred, a thousand, a million.</u> NOTE: that we use 'one' to add emphasis or to contrast with other numbers: I don't know one person who likes eating elephant meat. We've got six computers but only one printer.
with names of jobs:	John is <i>a doctor</i> . Mary is training to be <i>an</i> <i>engineer</i> . He wants to be <i>a dancer</i> .	
with nationalities and religions:	John is an English<u>man</u>. Kate is a Catholic .	John is British.
